They had seen him die. A horrific death. Designed to maximize discomfort, intensify pain and prolong the agony as long as possible. It is called crucifixion and it existed long before the Romans chose to use it as their usual means of capital punishment. The Roman Empire was brutal when it wanted to be and that was pretty often. When it came to sending a message to a conquered people about not having second thoughts about revolting against the power and control of Rome, Rome would periodically crucify any number of the locals. They would do this is a public place and do everything they could to emphasize how cruel a way it was to die. Stay in line. Mind your manners. Go along with what we want—taxes, submission, compliance—and you could have a modicum of a life.

They had seen Jesus die like that. But that was Friday. This is Sunday. They saw him buried in Joseph of Arimathea's tomb and they saw the stone rolled across the entrance. Jesus was really dead and he was really buried. But that was Friday. This is Sunday. Now that tomb is open. Now that tomb has no body in it. Now that tomb is the resting place for his burial cloths but nothing else. Mary Magdalen got their first. And, at first, she thought someone must have stolen Jesus' body because it was gone. But who would unwrap a dead body from its burial cloths. Remove the cloths and then take the naked, bloodied, stiff body away? It made no sense. No. It didn't.
