Dear Friends in Christ.

A woman clothed with the sun. The moon under her feet; stars clustered around her head. Large with child. Awaiting to give birth. In danger. The red dragon seeking to devour her offspring. These are images so vivid and alive that they frighten us today. What happens to the woman? What happens to the child? What happens to the dragon?

The woman does give birth. The dragon is ready. And the dragon suddenly pounces. But not quickly enough. God intervenes and snatches the child to the safety of the heavenly kingdom. The child is out of danger. The woman. She is suddenly taken to the desert, to that place of testing of the Jewish people. She too will be tested. But she will not fail like the original Eve failed. She will not be killed. She has been rescued. The evil one is very angry but has failed.

Is the child the Christ child? Yes. Yes, it is.
